

Transcript of SCCORR Stakeholder Meeting, May 1, 2025.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: Think I'll start recording. Um. We also are doing AI notes on this gang. So just Fyi, so welcome to the score stakeholder meeting. Thanks for joining us.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Yes. Hi! Everyone.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: We'll wait just a couple more minutes to let people join, and if they had didn't realize they needed to update their zoom before they could join. Sometimes there's a. Delays that you didn't expect, so we will let that be as is for a moment. Good morning, Mike. Thank you for the greeting.

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Hilfiker: Yay!

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. I hear birds outside my windows lately. Anybody else, and I'm so excited.

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Weylin Ryan | He/Him | Visit Durango: Now the ravens and peregrines were out today, flying around.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Oh! Nice.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Pretty. You have rins very cool.

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Chara Ragland: Mhm.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. Well, I will go ahead and start, and then, as people show up, they will. I want to thank everybody first. So much for being here. As you realize, the focus of our meeting is on our draft priority plan on wildlife conservation and outdoor recreation. So we'll get to that. But it's been too long since we did introductions. So we're going to go around. I will assign people based on how they are. In my.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Group um. And I will start. My name is Elli Morris. I'm the facilitator. Oh, I forgot to tell you the things that I wanted you to say I was just going to be an example first. So share your name, the organization you're with, and then a favorite location that you have in the San Juans. My name is Elli Morris. I am the facilitator with Kore and my current favorite San Juan location is the top of Mullis Pass, because when I get there I'm.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Bicycle will all be downhill for the iron horse. Ken you are next.

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Hilfiker: My name's Ken Hilfiker. Um, my favorite place in. The San Juan's probably would be um.

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Hilfiker: Coal Bank Pass, going up to Engineer Mountain to look at the wildflowers. And I'm associated with all sorts of outdoor recreation and snowmobiling and atving.

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Hilfiker: Elli's muted.

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Chara Ragland: Elli's muted.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Sorry, Eric Pearson, if you'll go next.

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Chara Ragland: Okay.

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Eric Pierson: Sure. Hi, everybody uh! My name's Eric Pearson. I'm uh with Durango trails. And I would have to say over the.

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Eric Pierson: 35 years I've been in in Durango that. My favorite place in the San Juans is.

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Eric Pierson: Up high in the La Plata Mountains, the. The uh the the race course for the Kennebec Mountain Run is spectacular, and uh.

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Eric Pierson: That's that's the place for me.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: All right, Chero Raglan, you're next.

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Chara Ragland: I'm Cheryl Ragland. I represent the great old Broads for wilderness as well as the Bonita Pete mining district. Um community advisory Group, and my favorite place.

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Chara Ragland: In the San Juan's is probably the grenadiers.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Andy Huck.

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andrewhawk: I'm Andy Hawk, the Associate Director of San Juan Mountains Association.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: We can just barely hear you, Andy.

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andrewhawk: Alright! Let's see.

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andrewhawk: No clue. Why, Elli. There we go!

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andrewhawk: Nope. How's that, Elli?

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: You're still low. Just be in the theater and project.

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andrewhawk: I'm Andy, the Associate Director of San Juan Mountains Association, and my favorite area right now to explore has actually been.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Go ahead!

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andrewhawk: To the east of Havaland and Chris Park. I've been enjoying kind of going out there and poking around at things.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Cool. Thank you. All right. Waylon.

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Weylin Ryan | He/Him | Visit Durango: My name's Waylon Ryan. I'm with visit Durango. So I'm the one everyone loves to hate with the visitors and tourists here in town. But uh, that's okay. We're trying to minimize their impact. And then my favorite place in the San Juan's has been and probably always will be, Columbine Lake with the real Columbine Lake off

the backside of Iceta on the way to Half Moon. Uh, no cars backpacking. It's great. No vehicle noise.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Nice, all right. Owen.

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Owen Tallmadge - Durango Parks & Rec: Hi, everybody! Owen Tallmadge, natural resource manager with city of Durango Parks, and rec. Um.

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Owen Tallmadge - Durango Parks & Rec: My favorite place, lately. Is over by the twin sisters.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Cool. And David Whittle.

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David Whittle- DNR Regional Partnerships: Yeah. Hi, everyone. My name's David. I'm a part of the regional partnerships at Cpw. Filling in for Tory today. Um, my favorite place is. Probably I think it's the animos is that am I saying it? Right river down in Durango? I've been there a couple of times, but want to explore more.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Thank you. Brian meter.

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Bryan Meador: I'm Brian Metterson with Slatter Snowmobile Club. Um. Probably my favorite place is anywhere. The snow is deep.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. Uh, Nick Olsen.

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Nick Olson | NFF: Morning. Everybody, Nick Olson, with the National Forest Foundation, Um. Covering the San Juan National Forest, my colleague, Molly Sander, Marley Sanders. Um.

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Nick Olson | NFF: I think I'll echo the grenadier shout out, and I particularly like the Whitehead trail that gives a spectacular view of the north side of the Grenadiers.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Awesome, Brittany.

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Brittany Leffel, WWA: Good morning. Everyone um. Yeah. Brittany Leffel, with Winter Wildlands Alliance. Um, I work as our Colorado policy manager. My favorite is the La Platas, just.

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Brittany Leffel, WWA: I am like 10 min from the trailhead. And so this winter I got to know the area very well whether it was covered in snow, or I was off roading up to the top of Kennebec. It's just. It just feels like home. But uh, I'm excited to explore other places in the San Juan this summer, and then have a new answer in the fall.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: All right. Heather.

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Heather Houk CSU Extension: Good morning. I'm heather. How can I work for Csu extension, the agriculture and horticulture specialist? So I feel like I should be taking notes, because I've been here for going on a decade, and I still know very little, because I spend all my time mostly working with farmers. And they're not up in the La Platas. But I will say that Colbank Pass has been a fun place, as my son was little when we 1st moved here, we'd go up there and sled in the winter, and then I'd go up back up in the spring and check out the wildflowers. So.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Mhm.

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Heather Houk CSU Extension: So far I haven't gotten very far.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: This is.

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Heather Houk CSU Extension: So I I should be taking notes.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Well, it is being recorded. All right, Kara.

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Cara Gildar-Montelores Coalition: Hi! I'm Kara Gildar with Montelouris coalition on the other side of the mountains, and one of my favorite paces that just seems to keep unfolding for me is going up the Cross mountain trail. By Lizard head.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Nice all right. Nate Greason.

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Nate Greason: Yeah, absolutely. My name is Nate. I'm with Durango Devo. My favorite spot in the San Juans is definitely um. The biking you can do off.

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Nate Greason: Coalbank. Someone mentioned the same trailhead. Really a special spot.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Thanks. Mike White.

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Mike Wight: Good morning, Mike White, with great outdoors. Colorado! Um, Brittany, me, we must be neighbors. I live in Hesperus, close to the La Platas, too, and I've. Gotta say the Twin Lakes area.

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Mike Wight: Camping up there, or. Getting up. Hesper's Peak is probably my favorite.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Cool. Okay. Megan. Mast.

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Megan Mast, BLM Silverton: Hey! Good morning! Can you hear me?

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Yes.

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Megan Mast, BLM Silverton: Okay. Good uh, Megan, mass, I'm with the blm in Silverton. Um.

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Megan Mast, BLM Silverton: Uh so many places hard to choose. But American basin is one of my faves.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Nice. Thank you. Jordan.

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Jordan Williams: Hey! There! Can you all hear me?

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Yes.

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Jordan Williams: I'm in my car right now. Okay. I think.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: We could hear you, but then, now we can't.

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Jordan Williams: Exactly. On my way.

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Jordan Williams: You'll have records and stuff. On my way to.

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Jordan Williams: A meeting. But.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. So, Jordan, you were.

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Jordan Williams: Like.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Very scrambled. Jordan is with Continental Divide trail coalition, and I don't know your favorite place, but maybe you can put it in the chat, and I'll read it because we can't understand you. All right, Ed Tolan. Ed, can you unmute.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: There you go!

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Ed Tolen: I'm trying, Elli.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: You got it.

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Ed Tolen: I was having issues. Uh Ed Tolan. I'm with 4 corners backcountry horseman.

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Ed Tolen: And my favorite place is the Poison Park area north of Pagosa Springs.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay, cool. Thank you. And Melissa.

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Melissa: Hey, everyone! This is Melissa May with Mountain Studies Institute. I'm also uh joining remotely, and I'll say my favorite place is. Pistorius Reservoir, my favorite place to go birding this time of year.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Oh, nice. Okay. And, Julia, you joined just in time. We are introducing ourselves with our name, the organization we're with, and a favorite place in the San Juans.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Okay. I'm Julia Ledford with Mountain Studies Institute. Um wow!

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Julia Ledford, MSI: The San Juans are my favorite place. In general.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Um. I really love. After work trips up to Hematite Lake.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay, great. Thank you so much. And as Heather pointed out, we're all learning like new places to all these different areas. And I forgot.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: Was it.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: To come circle around to my left.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: What?

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Which would be yes, I got all of this side. And now.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: I wanna go.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Um, Stephanie, will you please go.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: Yeah, yeah. Nobody said any place over near Red Mountain. I'm so I'm gonna say, Mcmillan. So.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. Awesome.

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Stephanie Weber, SJMA: Yeah. Okay. Alright. Thank you. Bye.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay. Now, did I miss anyone. Okay. Good.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Uh. Well, we got to do this virtually right now, but on May 17, th if you would like be part of our volunteer fair, you are welcome to.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Join us there. We have about 15 organizations from Skore that will be sharing their. Volunteer opportunities that they have throughout the year. I handed out flyers around town yesterday, and people were so excited and they wanted to share it that people wanted to come there. They wanted to know if they could post it on their social media accounts. So I think it's going to be really good.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: The point is several points, but one is, we want us as an organization to get to know each other and be there. We also want to help our public lands, and we want to help the public be able to know how they can contribute volunteer hours to y'all's. Projects that you have. So Stephanie has put the link to the web page that has volunteer event information in it, and if you, with your organization wants to join us, there is still time. We can still do that, and also, as I believe, who added that.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Owen. Yes, remember, we can share these favorite places. But don't social media them because we don't want our areas to just be selfies. We want them to be areas of engagement where we give back and take care of them as well as what all they give to us. So thank you, Owen, for that reminder. Okay.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: So our agenda today is pretty brief. We're going to hear from Julia. She's going to give us an update on the recreation mapping that they've been able to produce for us, and we've got some visuals that are really great. So excited to hear what Julia offers. Then we're going to get into breakout rooms. We have 5 different breakout rooms for the various sections of our draft. Left.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Keyword here, draft priority plan that we are putting together. And we're going to give y'all plenty of time to really focus on that section you're in and help polish up what the A/C group has provided for us. So 1st we'll hear from Julia, and then I'll give you some more details about our breakup, our breakout rooms.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Ah, thanks, Elli, I'll. Um.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: I'm gonna request to share my screen. If that's okay. Um. So I'm Julia Ludford. I am a Gis specialist with Mountain Studies Institute, and I'm doing the um kind of pulling together data sets uh to create an online interactive map to use for score.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Um. I.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Have pulled most of this together. Um! Can you see this.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Screen. Okay, um, I've pulled most of the data sets together. We uh, Ms has done a few projects like this. So a lot of these data sets we kind of already had um, and it was a little bit of just shifting to a slightly different geography. Um, but.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Yes.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: There's a lot in here, and I'm going to create a more user friendly version of this. So it will be kind of a web app um where folks can go toggle layers on and off and on. And so we have data related to recreation use. So we have stuff from San Juan mountains, associations, forest ambassadors who are keeping track of how many people they see. Every day. We have trail counters that are around the city of Durango, and some from the San Juan National Forest.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: We have information about commercial river use. Um, and from Strava, which is a um, an app where folks record their uh activities like mountain biking or hiking or running.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Ah! We have some infrastructure data sets related to recreation.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Including roads and trails. We have the wildlife data that uh Colorado parks and wildlife has.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Put together and contributed for this map. And then we have some information about management areas. Um, so this is kind of meant to be a synthesis of data that's available publicly, and that.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Land managers, decision makers. Anyone that's like trying to make work happen on the ground could use this map to kind of justify projects for a Grant application or decide where to funnel resources. So an example. I was looking at the draft. Priority plan and one of the project.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Priorities was to. Put more forest ambassadors out on the ground.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: So maybe Sjma is looking for like, where should we put forest ambassadors on the ground like, where are the busy areas? Where are we needing to capture folks attention. And so they may look at this map and look around for look at the

recreation, use data and see where busy areas are, and one area, I noticed, for example, was the Dry Fork. Oh, sorry! It'd probably be helpful if you could see.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Um. The key or the legend, um.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: So this is our Strava data in these hexagons. Um, and this is the number of uh users. That kind of started their activity at this trailhead. So um the Dry Fork area uh lights up as one of our busy busier areas. So that's an example of like a location. Um, where folks could funnel resources um. To target education and outreach to visitors and trail users. So there's many, many applications for this.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Map, and I'm really excited to see how it's used. This is also part of our draft. So we'll have time to add data sets to this refine data sets that we already have, and make it a really robust resource for folks in this score. Geography who are trying to make work happen on the ground.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: Um, and yeah, this is still a draft. I can share the link in the chat, but.

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Julia Ledford, MSI: There will be um. Some further development of this resource.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Okay, thank you very much, Julia. That was great as she mentioned, this is draft. I think you finished it like this week. So that's not quite ready yet for the public to share, but we will, in our follow-up notes with the meeting, be able to give you

some of the. Links that we have, that Julia has provided that are again just going to be for our group to to look at and get an idea of what's going on, but they, once it is available for the public. We'll make sure to share that link with you also.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: All right, so that enables us to move on to our draft priority. Plan a couple things. We've mentioned this before. Make sure you want to know. This is a draft. This draft needs to be submitted to. Cpw. By June first.st We've got a really great start on our plan, and I would like to. Acknowledge the reason that we have such a great start on. That is because of our dedicated advisory committee members, and I want to call them out by name, because they have done so much work. On getting this together they are Shara Raglan.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Who is with great old Broads for wilderness, Eric Pearson with Durango trails, Ken Hilfikerker with Colorado, Snowmobile Association, and Pagosa Trail Riders, Luke Clancy, who is not able to make it today with Cpw. Luke Klein, who also wasn't able to make it. Today he's with backcountry hunters and anglers. And then Stephanie Weber with. Jma, and also Steve McClung, who's with Cpw. So big, shout out to you guys that have done this when y'all get when the stakeholders break out into your rooms, you'll see how much work that they've done pulling our draft together. So 1st off. Really really pleased with our A/C committee. Now.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Though what they had to do to receive all that gratitude was, they looked at various parts of our charter. They looked at other regional partnership initiatives and pulled things from their plans that seemed to work for our score region. The 3 main ones that they focused on were Noco places, route and envision chafee. We didn't do as much with envision chafee. Because it's pretty wordy, and we want ours to be a little bit more concise. So the 2 1st ones, Noco and Route, are ones that we focused on primarily. When you get into your breakout rooms, those leads have the links to those plans. If you should want to reference them as you're looking at what the advisory committee came up for score.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Let's see, when we get into our breakout rooms. The leads. Each of the A/C members took a section or a couple sections, and they wrote up.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: What we want to see for that particular part of it, like the elevator pitch, or our purpose, or our guiding principles. So the person that created that data and wrote that section. They are going to be your breakout lead. They'll be able to help guide you with. Why, they came up with that language what it's trying to accomplish, and. Just be a point person for you.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: And then. We're hoping we're going to be able to automatically assign the stakeholders to the breakout rooms. We'll see if that works, because we do have to specifically put the leaders in there. We just want to make sure that we've got kind of an even number might have to come in and adjust the numbers. If the automatic park doesn't flow, as we hope it will.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Then we do have some ideas for you to keep in mind when you're looking at all this. There's a new funding stream from Goco. Thank you, Mike, right? And what y'all are doing over there to support these. There's a 50 million dollars amount of funding over the next 10 years, and that will go to the regional partnerships. And so we want to make sure. That when we identify our high priority needs and projects in our region, that it will help us be successful when we apply for those grants. So that's going to be a really great opportunity for us to know what we need to do and how it fits in with the larger scheme of the work of Cpw. And Goco.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Um. You'll be in your breakout rooms for about um. 40, 45 min, I think, because we want to come back and have about 15 min to wrap up and get some updates from each room to see kind of where everything happened, and any input that people need to do. And, Mike, thank you for the clarification. You just said that that funding is split between Goco and Cpw. And thank you for everybody that.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Buys, lottery tickets. So yeah, then we'll rejoin, and then we'll have a couple of um.

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Elli Morris, SCCORR Facilitator: Announcements at the very end. But that's the basic layout and the purpose of it. So before we split into the breakout rooms, does anyone have any questions. Yes, Stephanie.
